# **School Safety Resources**

October 21-27<sup>th</sup> was **National Safe Schools Week**. We know that safety is the number one priority for you as an administrator, and we want to provide you with a collection of resources to help you evaluate and improve safety at your school. Below you will find resources on ensuring safe school facilities, evaluating current procedures, and improving social and emotional learning to help you create a safe environment for students to learn and grow. #### What do the numbers say?

According to the Educator's School Safety
Network, in the 2017-2018 school year, there were 3,375 school related threats recorded nationally, which was a 62% increase from the 2016-1017 school year. Even more concerning, the number of actual incidents of violence requiring a response from law enforcement increased by 113% in the last year!

#### **Ensuring Safe School Facilities**

## **Evaluating Current Procedures**

Creating, practicing, and implementing an effective crisis plan at your school can be a very difficult task. As you begin to evaluate your current procedures, here are some resources that may help to ensure that you are adequately preparing your staff and students for a variety of crisis situations.

### Social & Emotional Learning Resources

According to the article, "Can SEL Reduce School Violence?" published in ASCD's *Educational Leadership*, "Research has found that social-emotional skills can lead to safer schools. A landmark meta-analysis by Durlak and colleagues (2011) examined 213 studies of K-12 school-based SEL programs and found that students in schools that implemented such programs had significant improvements in social-emotional skills (such as identifying emotions, perspective taking, and conflict resolution) and fewer conduct problems. These schools also reported less aggression and delinquent acts, showing a direct link between SEL and safer schools" (Nickerson 47). Click here to read the full article.
